1. Welcome

The meeting was called to order at 10:36am. David welcomed everyone to the meeting, did a land acknowledgement, and gave attendees instructions on voting privileges.

2. Adoption of Agenda (Attachment 1)

3. Minutes of 2022 Annual General Meeting (Attachment 2)

MOTION 2: That the minutes from the 2022 AGM be approved as presented. M/S: Adam Kilfoyle/Naomi Russell. CARRIED.

4. Board & Staff Reports from 2022-23 Year (Attachments 3a, 3b & 3c)

David summarized activities since the last AGM as outlined in the attached board and staff reports. He reviewed some of the highlights:

Our programming began with MCA's first outdoor choral festival GATHER, setting an
exciting tone for a return to in-person activities after nearly three years of altered
programming due to the pandemic.

- ChoralFest and MB Sings (formerly Provincial Honour Choirs) returned to in-person and although our registrations were lower compared to pre-pandemic years, both events were considered successful and were welcomed back by our choral community.
- MCA's IDEA Special Interest Group planned and hosted a small symposium, BEYOND.
 Essentially a "mini-Podium", the two-day event brought those in the choral community together to explore longstanding choral traditions, experience new ways of thinking, and expand our practices.

Jenny drew attention to MCA's work behind the scenes, emphasizing the increased use of our lending library, our focus on communications and marketing, and the creation of a new strategic and fund development plan to guide MCA's work.

5. Auditors' Report and Financial Statements (Attachment 4)

Adam presented the Financial Statements for the year ending August 31, 2022, and highlighted the following:

- These financial statements reflect MCA's activities when we were largely still in pandemic restrictions.
- This is MCA's first year using Olafson & Jones as auditors.
- The in-kind donation from St. John's Music (large sheet music donation) is reflected in both our revenue and expenses.
- There were increased staff costs comparative to years past from adding Brittany to the MCA team and hiring summer students in 2022.
- MCA has demonstrated good fiscal responsibility with only a small deficit of \$1,100 for the year ending August 31, 2022.

6. Interim Financial Statements to May 31, 2023 (Attachment 5)

Jenny presented an update on MCA's finances up to May 31, 2023, and highlighted:

- MCA has done well with grants this year. Outside of our annual operating grants, we
 received several project and professional development grants to help offset the cost of
 our programming, resources, and operations.
- Although we lost money with GATHER, we still deem the festival a success considering the overwhelmingly positive response from the community.
- ChoralFest registrations were lower than expected and our costs have gone up since prepandemic years.

- Sponsorships and donations helped to ensure MB Sings costs were covered despite lower registrations.
- INSPIRE, the senior high leadership camp, has been postponed to summer 2024.
- The funding we received from FCMM for the Frances Seaton Choral Composition Competition has now run out, so we are putting it on hold while we review the competition and source new funding.
- MCA has been purchasing memberships with other arts organizations to make new connections and expand our network (Unison, Creative Manitoba, Manitobans for the Arts, etc.).
- We continue to strive to be responsible stewards of the money we receive from our funders and members to sustain MCA's mission, vision, and goals.
- As of May 31, our revenues are greater than our expenses (net positive), and we are projecting to break even by the end of the fiscal year.
- 7. Appointment of Auditors for 2022/2023 Fiscal Year

8. Plans for 2023-24 – Program Slate & Budget (Attachments 6a & 6b)

Jenny and Jorrel presented the approved program slate and a break-even budget for next year. MCA wants to focus on supporting and building our choral community and this is reflected in both the program slate and budget for next year. They noted:

- Our flagship programs ChoralFest and MB Sings will remain in place.
- We are working with leaders in Westman, Norman and Parkland to do a "ChoralFest Tour" to ensure our programming reaches all Manitobans.
- New programs include the INSPIRE Leadership Camp, Member 101 session, Choral Reading Session and networking events, and Sing-along events.
- GATHER and BEYOND will not be happening this season but we are keeping them in mind for future years.
- The Run for Music and Fundraising Gala are dependent on whether MCA can hire someone for the fundraising position.
- MCA will be increasing our staff team to three or four in the fall (dependent on funding).
- We anticipate grants, donations, and sponsorships to be higher if the fundraising position is filled.
- We are intentionally budgeting more for advertising, promotion, and outreach to ensure MCA is connecting with our community and reaching new audiences across Manitoba.
- 9. Election of Directors

 Treasurer and presented him with a card and gift on behalf of MCA.

- Stuart explained that due to our board restructuring in 2022 most of our current Board Directors are currently in the middle of their terms.

President's Report

Last year, the board of MCA gathered to envision how to best embark upon a new season of choral singing. The world was slowly coming out of the pandemic, and we understood that there would be a lot of work to do to bring choral singing back to the heights it had once enjoyed in the province before public singing was shut down. We generated some great ideas and crafted some ambitious plans. And we went for it. I'm proud to say that this past year has seen MCA produce some fantastic events for the provincial choral community. From singers to conductors, member supporters, donors, and audiences, Manitoba Choral Association has worked to enrich the lives of Manitobans through the art of choral music.

In October 2022, MCA undertook its first event of the year with GATHER, an all-day choral concert in the Lyric Theatre at Assiniboine Park. Even though the weather was rather cool, we couldn't be happier with the turnout. We had food trucks, art vendors and other arts organizations represented on site throughout the day. And of course, the amazing line-up of choral groups including the Buffalo Gals, Rainbow Harmony Project, the University of Manitoba and Canadian Mennonite University choirs, and many more, as well as a workshop with Cory Campbell, and JP Hoe capping the event. It was a great way to say that choral singing was back.

Manitoba ChoralFest was finally in person in 2022. We had a great slate of clinicians from throughout Canada and changed the format slightly form years past. Even so, with many choral programs in a rebuilding stage, attendance was not as high as in previous years. We anticipate that will change in the future, and certainly this past November saw an increase in performers and attendees.

We also had a fantastic Manitoba Sings event in February 2022, as we did just a few weeks ago. We're enjoying the new location at Portage Avenue Church. The adult choir was quite full, but youth numbers were lower than in previous years. No doubt, this is also a by-product of the pandemic.

And finally, I just want to mention our BEYOND choral symposium. This event was meant to engage and inspire choral educators from around the province with clinics from prominent choral educators from Canada and the US. Among our many presenters, Melanie DeMore reminded us of the power of music and of singing within community. She showed us the power music has to engage people, to reflect, to tell stories, and to provide meaning. Doug Friesen showed us how thinking outside the box can lead us to brand new music learning experiences. All of our presenters were engaging and experts in their field. And of course, visiting and catching up with colleagues is always a great reason to get together.

The future is certainly looking bright for Manitoba Choral Association. I have to give a very large thank-you to our fantastic Executive Director, Jenny Steinke-Magnus, for her tireless work and energy. The work she has been able to do has been nothing short of amazing. And I want to thank our other staff and board members for giving their time and energies toward making MCA such an important vehicle for choral music in the province. You're all amazing people and your contributions to MCA are invaluable.

There is still much work to do. We've heard from so many people that rebuilding their choral programs after the pandemic will take time. Manitoba Choral Association wants to be there as we build the future of choral singing in this province together.

Since our last AGM, we have re-launched our old programs and created new ones, expanded our resource offerings, grown our membership, and increased our staff capacity. I am both thrilled and humbled to be part of this great work.

Awards & Competitions

- <u>Emily Gayleard</u> received the 2022 Bert Kroeker Scholarship and <u>Lauren Fehr</u> received the 2022 David G.H. Waters Hymn Sing Memorial Award.
- Awards of Distinction were given out at our June 2023 AGM:

- We encourage the MCA community to nominate individuals, choirs, and organizations that

- After a board meeting discussion in March, it was determined that the FSCCC would be put on hold for the time being, with the plan to review the competition for 2024-25.

Choir 101

We offered a two-day hybrid workshop on September 9-10, 2022 for beginner/novice singers just in time for the choral season to start. Dr. Stuart Sladden led singers through the basics of sight-singing and theory and the fundamentals of vocal technique over two days at the CMU South Campus.

Thanks to FCMM for providing a grant to support this event.

GATHER

MCA's first outdoor choral festival on October 1, 2022 at the Assiniboine Park Lyric Theatre was a great success! It was a chilly overcast day but that didn't stop people from coming out. We estimate about 1,000 attended throughout the day. Nine choirs performed, from Winnipeg and the Interlake: CMU Chamber Choir, Ecco Singers, Fort Richmond Collegiate, Margaret's Choir, MBCI Singers, Quarry Choristers, Rainbow Harmony Project, St. James-Assiniboia Divisional Senior Choir, and UofM Upper Voices.

We also featured performances from Buffalo Gals, Juvel, Those Guys, and JP Hoe (who collaborated with the university choirs for the finale performance) and we held three workshops: Rose Van der Hooft presented morning and afternoon yoga workshops, and Cory Campbell presented a mid-day participatory workshop on his original song <u>Gratitude</u>.

We were fortunate to secure four food vendors and 10 artisans to sell at the festival. We also invited several community organizations to promote their services and programs in our community tent. We organized an arts & crafts tent and a face painting tent.

Thanks to The Winnipeg Foundation for providing a grant to offset the cost of running this event. Thanks to our other sponsors: Assiniboine Credit Union, The Winnipeg Free Press for providing advertising, RBC for providing volunteers, St. James Assiniboia School Division for providing risers & tables, and Tim Hortons & Red River Co-Op for providing food for volunteers.

TEMPO

This annual one-day professional development event was held virtually on October 21, 2022 by the Manitoba Music Educators' Association (MMEA, of which MCA is an affiliate partner organization). It provided an opportunity for Manitoba music teachers to gather individually or in small groups to view virtual presentations on various musical topics throughout the day. Among the choral presenters were Charlotte Botha, Marla Fontaine, Melissa Remus Spraggs, Terrence Taylor, and Rose van der Hooft.

ChoralFest

We were excited to hold our first in-person ChoralFest in three years from November 14-23, 2022. Adjudicators and clinicians included:

- <u>Senior Years/Community Choirs</u>: Dr. Jennifer Lang (Saskatoon, SK), Dr. Tracy Wong (Toronto, ON), Dr. Andrée Dagenais (Brandon), Hussein Janmohamed (Vancouver, BC)
- <u>Vocal Jazz Ensembles</u>: Duane Davis (Grand Rapids, MI), Kerry Marsh (Naples, FL), Julia Dollison (Naples, FL)
- Early Years/Middle Years Clinics: Liz Kristjanson (Winnipeg), Marla Fontaine (Brandon, MB)

We took several calculated risks by hiring nearly all of our adjudicators and clinicians from outside of Winnipeg, offering in-school early and middle years clinics, and offering French adjudications to Senior Years choirs. NEW for 2022, all SY/Community choirs received two 20-min clinics from different clinicians instead of the normal 30-min clinic. Despite these changes, registrations were not as high as in years past.

We had the following registrations:

Senior Years – 57 Community Choirs – 14 Vocal Jazz – 21 <u>Middle Years Choirs – 9*</u> TOTAL = 101 choirs**

*No early years choirs signed up, though the in-school clinics were offered to all ages. Some MY choirs shared the clinic time with other schools (ex. one school invited others to their clinic; another had 2 clinics for their 2 choirs; and 3 choirs from 1 division came together for a pod-like experience)

For comparison's sake, in 2019 we had **133 choirs participate in ChoralFest (**68 SY, 12 Community, 27 Vocal Jazz, 25 EY/MY**).

We recognize that it will take time for choral programs to rebuild their numbers, which directly impacts participation in ChoralFest. We are looking forward to expanding ChoralFest even more for 2023 and are optimistic that this program will reach even more singers and choirs by doing so.

Thanks to Sing Canada Harmony and Manitoba Arts Council for contributing grants to offset the cost of running this program. We also received a FCMM grant to cover costs related to a ChoralFest tour, which we will defer to next year.

Senior High Choral Workshops

We held two workshops for senior high singers: one with MB Sings guest conductor Dr. Melissa Morgan (Regina) on January 27, 2023, and another one with BEYOND presenter Melanie DeMore Oakland, CA) on May 26. Overall these workshops engaged **450 singers** from high schools around the province in group singing.

MB Sings

After a three-year hiatus, the Provincial Honour Choirs program returned under a new name – MB Sings – with a new look and a new concert venue. With these intentional and meaningful changes, the feelings of community and togetherness, the celebration of song, and joy of music-making remains strong and steadfast in Manitoba.

Under the direction of our talented guest conductors, Dr. Melissa Morgan (Regina), Alisa Wiebe (Winnipeg), Jorrel Camuyong (Winnipeg) and Nancy Gomes Fast (Niverville), we welcomed 200 singers from across The Singing Province on January 27-29, 2023:

115 - Adult Choir

57 – Senior Choir (gr. 9-12)

28 – Junior Choir (gr. 5-8)

The finale concert took place at Portage Avenue Church with an opening song by Indigenous drummer and singer Jordan Bighorn (Winnipeg) and guest choir <u>Horizon</u> (Winnipeg), who sang *Refraction*, the 2022 winning composition of the <u>Frances Seaton Choral Competition</u> by <u>Leanne Cooper-Carrier</u>.

We look forward to continuing our traditions, establishing new ones and most importantly, inviting our community into song again in 2024 for our 40th anniversary of MB Sings.

Thanks to Triple E RV/Philipp Ens, Long & McQuade, and the Winnipeg Free Press for sponsoring this program.



BEYOND

MCA was thrilled to hold our first-ever choral symposium, <u>BEYOND</u>, on May 26-27, 2023. The event drew over **40 attendees** from around the province and took place at CMU (day sessions) and St. Norbert Arts Centre (closing event). The weekend featured sessions from presenters:

- Melanie DeMore (vocal activist, San Francisco, CA) and Doug Friesen (arts educator, ON) focused on vocal activism and improvisation respectively
- Cory Campbell (traditional singer & drummer, Winnipeg), Ray "Coco" Stevenson (traditional singer & drummer, Winnipeg), and Jordan Bighorn (traditional singer & drummer, Winnipeg) offered Indigenous music and teachings for choral leaders
- Nicole Stonyk (graduate student, Winnipeg) encouraged attendees to move beyond "Indigenous inclusion" in music
- Jenel Shaw (Executive Director of Arts AccessAbility Network Manitoba, Winnipeg) presented a session on accessibility in choir
- Caleb Rondeau and Roan Regan (choral singers & postsecondary students, Winnipeg) spoke to transgender/non-binary singer inclusion in choir

We have received overwhelmingly positive feedback about this new professional development program, an indication that we will surely look at holding it again in the future.

Thanks to Canada Council for the Arts; the Province of MB Arts, Culture, and Sport in Community Fund; the MB Arts Accessibility Fund; and Assiniboine Credit Union for funding this program.

Library

With choirs back in person, our choral lending library was busier than ever! In 2022 we scanned and uploaded thousands of pieces of music to our online platform, making it more accessible to people all over the province and beyond. It is an incredible amount of work to keep the library running smoothly and efficiently, but it is well worth it to provide this valuable resource to our community.

For 2022-23, **148 orders representing over 7,000 individual pieces of music** were sent out to individuals/choirs in the following regions:

OUTREACH & ADVOCACY HIGHLIGHTS

Membership

In 2022 we began using a new membership platform, *MembershipWorks*, to manage our membership, donation, and event data. Members are now able to log in to register for events, post choir events, and update their own profiles and choir information, which now appears in the Find a Choir section of our website.

We were glad to see members old and new taking out MCA memberships in 2022-23, and it is heartening to see that we have even surpassed pre-pandemic numbers! With the return to in-person TEMPO for 2023, and with expansion of our flagship programs into rural areas, we anticipate membership numbers to increase even more in 23-24.

Choral Events

MCA attended performances of the four regional youth choirs in October 2022, as well as performances of various choirs around Winnipeg and beyond throughout the year, as a way to demonstrate support to our membership and to connect with individuals in each community. We plan to make efforts to attend performances around the province on a regular basis going forward and are now exploring an opportunity to collaborate amongst the regional youth choirs in the future.

Intra-Provincial Special Interest Group

We held our first Intra-Provincial SIG meeting in January. Six people attended and there was representation from Norman, Westman, Central, and Winnipeg. The purpose of the group is to provide a space to liaise regularly with and provide support to all Manitoba regions so that MCA may build and strengthen relationships with choirs and members and strategically plan programs and support existing initiatives around the province. We will aim to meet 3-4 times per year to start.

Inter-Provincial Meetings

MCA continues to meet with representatives from other Choral Arts Service Organizations (CASOs) from across the country on a regular basis. I attended an in-person meeting in Montreal in June 2023 to connect with my counterparts and explore topics in the areas of Inclusion, Diversity, Equity, & Accessibility (IDEA), membership, and more.

Thanks to The Winnipeg Foundation, Winnipeg Arts Council, and Manitoba Arts Council for providing professional development funding for this trip.

External Memberships

MCA continues to contribute as an affiliated member and board representative for the Manitoba Music Educators' Association (MMEA) and the Foundation for Choral Music in Manitoba (FCMM). Recently we have also established memberships with Arts AccessAbility Network Manitoba, Creative Manitoba, the Association for Music Administrators of Manitoba (AMAM), Manitobans for the Arts, the Assiniboia Chamber of Commerce, Unison Canada, and Musica International.

OTHER HIGHLIGHTS

Communications & Marketing

We have been very busy in this area for 22-23, sharing regular posts and updates through our website, social media platforms, and e-newsletters. This year we also ordered merchandise and promotional materials with our new logo, all of which has been well received by the community. Merchandise is now available for sale on our website.

Strategic Planning / Fund Development

In 2022 the MCA board worked with Pamela Simmons of Corniche Consulting to update our strategic plan and create a fund development plan. Our new strategic plan (Attachment 3c) will guide MCA over the next 2-3 years. We are now working on a plan to determine how best to implement the fund development plan Pam has created for us.

Thanks to The Winnipeg Foundation for providing an organizational development grant to cover this project

Human Resources

MCA recently significantly increased our capacity on our staff team: in 2022 we hired Kathleen Murphy and Jenica Sul through the Canada Summer Jobs grant to digitize our music library, and in September, we were able to increase Brittany Mielnichuk's position to a full-time role. We have benefitted immensely from a larger staff team and at the end of 2023 were fortunate to be able to create another position (Administrative Assistant), for which we hired Alexis Chlopecki. Welcome to the team, Alexis!

Fundraising

Donors continue to be a vital component to our fundraising activities. We are grateful to all those who have supported MCA financially in 2022-23! In total, MCA supporters gave over \$16,000 to the organization, sponsors provided over \$2,000 in funds/in-kind sponsorships, and funding agencies provided over \$130,000 in grants to our organization. A complete list of donors and funders appears at the end of this report.

ACTIVITIES FOR 2023-2024

The 2023-24 year is again shaping up to be a busy one, with new, innovative, and expanded programs and services being offered to the choral community. I am continuing to focus on work behind the scenes, overseeing our programs, operations, and fundraising activities. Specifically on the slate are:

- **Programs**: Plan, implement, and expand programs and events, specifically ChoralFest (regional tour), MB Sings (40th anniversary celebration), and other Winnipeg 150: City of Song events; review and improve program evaluation process (see Program Slate, Attachment 5a)
- Music Library: Purchase new shelving, add donations into inventory, finish digitizing library holdings
- **Fund Development**: Implement the fund development plan to focus on building financial stability for MCA

- Funder & Donor Relations: Focus on building and strengthening relationships with major donors, sponsors, and funding agencies
- Policy Work: Develop policies in the areas of finance, volunteers, IDEA, etc.; continue to update Terms of Reference for board and committee positions
- Human Resources: Explore expanding staff team and focus on volunteer management
- Awards: Review criteria and strengthen application processes
- FSCCC: Review competition and decide on what it will look like going forward
- IDEA Special Interest Group: Launch this group and hold IDEA events accordingly
- PODIUM 2024: Attend Choral Canada's PODIUM on behalf of MCA

FINAL THOUGHTS

There are so many people who worked tirelessly behind the scenes to make 2022-23 a success. I am deeply grateful to our dedicated board, staff, and volunteer team, who have been integral in moving MCA forward in our program and operational goals. I truly feel part of a mutually supportive team, working together towards a common goal: seeing the Manitoba choral community flourish.

Our board members and volunteers stepped up in new and important ways in 2022-23, particularly for our new events, GATHER and BEYOND, and of course, the re-launch of our flagship programs, ChoralFest and MB Sings. I want to extend a huge thank-you to our program committees, and especially Kelsey Shiaro and Catherine Robbins, who chaired MB Sings and BEYOND committees respectively. Thank you to our staff as well: to Brittany for stepping up in every area of MCA's work (including those that were not in her job description); thanks to the newest member of our team, Alexis, who hit the ground running in fall 2023 and has taken on many important behind-the-scenes tasks. I have been so grateful for our small but mighty team!

Since the June 2023 AGM, we were fortunate to have found a treasurer, so thank you to Robyn for stepping into that role and has made the transition so seamless! I also want to take this opportunity to thank our outgoing Past President, Stuart, who has contributed in countless ways to MCA's programs and operations over the past six years. The organization has benefitted immensely from your experience and expertise in the ChoralFest, Vice President, President, and most recently, Past President roles. I have enjoyed working with you and wish you all the best. Please don't be a stranger to MCA!

I am so proud of the work we have accomplished in 2022-23, and yet I know there is still much work to do. I look forward to continuing this great work with the MCA team for 2023-24 and beyond!

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Members of Manitoba Choral Association Inc.

Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of Manitoba Choral Association Inc. (the Association), which comprise the statement of financial position as at August 31, 2023, and the statements of operations, changes in net assets and cash flows for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies.

In our opinion, the accompanying financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Association as at August 31, 2023, and the results of its operations and cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations (ASNPO).

Basis for Opinion

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

Other Matter

Budget information is presented in the statement of revenues and expenditures for information purposes only and has not been subject to audit.

Responsibilities of Management and Those Charged with Governance for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with ASNPO, and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is responsible for assessing the Association's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless management either intends to liquidate the Association or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

Those charged with governance are responsible for overseeing the Association's financial reporting process.

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. PURPOSE OF THE ASSOCIATION

Manitoba Choral Association Inc. (the "Association") is a not-for-profit organization of Manitoba. As a registered charity the Association is exempt from the payment of income tax under Subsection 149(1) of the Income Tax Act.

The Association was instituted for the purposes of promoting, planning and executing choral festivals, programs workshops and providing choral opportunities to singers, directors, and composers throughout Manitoba.

2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of presentation

The financial statements were prepared in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations (ASNFPO).

Cash equivalents

Highly liquid investments with maturities of one year or less at date of purchase are classified as cash equivalents.

Inventory

Inventory is valued at the lower of cost and net realizable value with the cost being determined on a first-in, first-out basis.

Goods and services tax

Contributed materials and services are recoverable at 50% as a rebate. The unrecoverable portion is recorded as an expense with the rebate treated as a receivable.

Capital assets

Capital assets are stated at cost or deemed cost less accumulated amortization and are amortized over their estimated useful lives on a declining balance basis at the following rates:

Computer equipment 30% Furniture and fixtures 20%

The Association regularly reviews its capital assets to eliminate obsolete items.

Capital assets acquired during the year but not placed into use are not amortized until they are placed into use.

Impairment of long lived assets

The Association tests for impairment whenever events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying amount of the assets may not be recoverable. Recoverability is assessed by comparing the carrying amount to the projected future net cash flows the long-lived assets are expected to generate through their direct use and eventual disposition. When a test for impairment indicates that the carrying amount of an asset is not recoverable, an impairment loss is recognized to the extent the carrying value exceeds its fair value.

2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

Revenue recognition

Manitoba Choral Association Inc. follows the deferral method of accounting for contributions.

Revenue generated from grants and restricted donations are recognized as revenue in the year in which the related expenses are recorded.

Revenue generated from unrestricted provincial programs, donations, membership and other are recognized as revenue when received or receivable, if the amount to be received can be reasonably determined and collection is reasonably assured.

Leases

Leases are classified as either capital or operating leases. At the time the Association enters into a capital lease, an asset is recorded with its related long-term obligation to reflect the acquisition and financing. Rental payments under operating leases are expensed as incurred.

Contributed goods and services

Donated goods and services are recorded when fair value can be reasonably estimated and when the materials and services are used in the normal course of the organization's operations and would otherwise have been purchased.

Measurement uncertainty

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amount of assets and liabilities, disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the period. Such estimates are periodically reviewed and any adjustments necessary are reported in earnings in the period in which they become known. Actual results could differ from these estimates.

Financial instruments

Financial instruments are recorded at fair value when acquired or issued. In subsequent periods, financial assets with actively traded markets are reported at fair value, with any unrealized gains and losses reported in income. All other financial instruments are reported at amortized cost, and tested for impairment at each reporting date. Transaction costs on the acquisition, sale, or issue of financial instruments are expensed when incurred.

The Association signed a premises lease agreement for a period of November 1, 2020 to October 31, 2023. The rent during the period will consist of monthly payments of \$1,423 with a 2% increase each year. The lease can be determined with 90 days' written notice.

On March 28, 2019, the Association started leasing its printer for a period of five years and six months at \$497 per quarter plus GST and PST. The printer lease ends in September 2024.

8. MANITOBA CHORAL ASSOCIATION ENDOWMENT FUND AND BERT KROEKER SCHOLARSHIP FUND

In 2006, the Association created the "Manitoba Choral Association Endowment Fund" and the "Bert Kroeker Scholarship Fund" (the "Funds"), which are managed under separate agreements with the Winnipeg Foundation.

As the Funds are managed under agreements by the Winnipeg Foundation, Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations stipulate the Funds do not meet the criteria of an asset and therefore are not recorded on the balance sheet.

10. FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS

The association, as part of its operations, carries a number of financial instruments. It is management's opinion that the association is not exposed to significant interest, currency, credit, liquidity or other price risk arising from these financial instruments except as otherwise disclosed.

11. LINE OF CREDIT

The Association has an operating line of credit of a maximum of \$40,000. The operating line of credit is due on demand, bears interest at bank prime and is secured by term deposits in the amount of \$15,096. As of August 31, 2023 the line of credit used was \$nil (2022 - \$nil), and the prime rate was 7.20% (2022 - 4.70%).

PROGRAM/EVENT DETAILS

Choir 101

September 2023

This one-day professional development workshop for singers will take place right as choirs start their choral seasons in September. The workshop is designed for novice choristers with a limited background in music. The basics of sight-singing and theory will be addressed throughout the day, as will the fundamentals of vocal technique. The goal is to equip choristers through participatory learning with skills which can be applied in their weekly choir rehearsals for the 2023-2024 season.

Topics to be covered include vocal production, rhythm, melody, harmony, voice parts, dynamics, and the physical and mental health benefits of singing and participating in choral ensembles.

Member 101

September 2023

This is an opportunity for all members, even those who have been MCA members for some time, to attend a virtual session to learn more about what MCA membership is all about. The session will be recorded and posted to our website following the session.

Regional Youth Choir Performances

October 2023

Regional Youth Choir tours and performances will take place across the province in October. MCA plans to attend the performances, and is exploring the possibility of a collaboration between the regions to plan a joint concert in a central location, either for 2023 or 2024.

TEMPO

October 21, 2023

MCA will once again work with MMEA to plan TEMPO 2023, which will once again be held in-person at Mennonite Brethren Collegiate Institute on October 20, 2023. Choral presenters confirmed so far are Dr. Janet Brenneman (Winnipeg) and Tracy Wong (Toronto). We look forward to connecting with music educators and members at the event!

ChoralFest

November 13-22, 2023

Our flagship program will go ahead in 2023 with some exciting additions and expansions:

- > Senior Years Choirs (Grades 9-12) will perform in the pod system (up to three choirs), and afterwards will receive two 20-min clinics (from different clinicians).
- Middle Years Choirs (Grades 5-8) will have the option of registering for:
 - Performance in pod system + two 20-min clinics (at ChoralFest choral venue); or
 - o 30-min clinic tailored to the choir in their school.*
- Early Years Choirs (Grades K-4) will receive a 30-min clinic tailored to their choir in their school.
- Community Choirs will perform in the pod system (up to three choirs), and afterwards will receive two 20-min clinics (from different clinicians). NEW for 2023, community choirs will have the option of requesting an evening or daytime slot!
- Vocal Jazz Choirs will perform in the pod system (up to three choirs), and afterwards will receive two 20-min clinics (from different clinicians).
- > **NEW! Regional Clinics**: Choirs in Westman, Parkland, and/or Norman are eligible to participate in a special pilot project—ChoralFest will come to them.

Inspired by open-mic nights and *Choir!Choir!Choir!* events, this event will gather choral enthusiasts for an evening of socializing and choral singing at a local coffee shop or brewery. Awards & Competitions

May 31, 2024 Deadline

MCA offers several awards and scholarships each year to foster and support local talent and professional development. These include the MCA Awards of Distinction (MCA Award for Artistic Excellence, MCA Spirit Award, MCA New Voice Award), the Bert Kroeker Scholarship, and the David G.H. Waters Hymn Sing Memorial Award. Every summer, the winners and recipients are announced and members of the choral community are recognized for their achievements.
